

# Green Country Woodworkers Meeting Minutes, February 2019 by Bill Morgan

The GCWW club met on 2/21/19 at Bill Nay's shop. In attendance were Bill Nay, Gregg Zumwalt, Ray Hucek, Arthur Barber, Mike Ruttgen, Earle Smith, Venton Knarr, Jim Rouse, Harold Blalock, Robert Rothenbucher, and Bill Morgan.

General: In Mike Mitchell's absence, Gregg called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone. After a brief discussion, it was agreed that this month's 4th Thursday dinner (6:00 PM on 2/28) will be at The Golden Corral at Mingo and 71st Street.

As a follow up from last month's meeting, Jim Rouse reported that he has contacted Matt White (White and Sons) regarding hardwood availability and price information. Jim supplied copies of what's currently available and the prices for February.

Show and Tell: Earle Smith showed 2 cutting boards that he recently completed. The boards are constructed of maple, cherry and padauk. and incorporate feet to hold the board above the work surface. One has a semi -circular cut out on one edge so that chopped material can be easily transferred to a plate from 3 sides.

Program: Bill Nay has done a number of veneering projects ranging from flat patterns to curved drawer fronts. He broke the sometimes daunting subject of veneering into it's basic components - - veneer material, glue, and substrate - - and then elaborated on some of the variables and options for each.

Veneer of course can be made by simply slicing and sanding thin strips of hardwood - but it's more commonly purchased, Bill reviewed several sources and the various types of material available. Paper backed veneer is essentially ready to fit and apply while non-backed material needs to be softened and flattened. For his presentation, Bill had prepared some veneer by spraying it with a commercially available softener and then pressing it flat between paper towels to dry. Several hours (and paper towels) later, the material was ready to apply.

Almost any material can be used as a substrate including Masonite, particle board, plywood or any hard or softwood. Bill passed around several examples of various combinations.

Bill has used glues especially formulated for veneering as well as hide glue, Titebond, Elmers, and contact cement. He demonstrated the application of a pre-catalyzed glue and discussed various applicators and techniques.

Depending on the application, the veneer may need to be cut and matched to cover the substrate or to achieve a particular pattern. As usual, there are a number of ways of accomplishing this. Bill has used simple pocket knives, exacto knives, utility knives and veneer saws to cut and fit the veneer. He demonstrated the use of these and then the procedure for matching and taping the pieces together prior to the glue up.

Smaller flat assemblies can be simply clamped together while the glue dries, but larger or curved surfaces present more of a problem. Large flat assemblies can be done by a process of manually pushing the air out by working from the center out toward the edges. Bill has 2 vinyl vacuum bags which work well for both flat and curved pieces, The glued up assemblies are placed in the bag on a platen that incorporates a series of grooves for air passage. The assembly is then covered with a filter material (also to facilitate air passage). A vacuum pump evacuates the bag and the component parts are pressed together by the atmospheric pressure. Bill used the smaller of the 2 bags to demonstrate the process.

Bill fielded a number of questions and the group shared some woodworking experiences and enjoyed a selection of drinks and snacks.




Bill described the various types of veneer available to purchase, how to make your own veneer, soften the veneer to make it flat and manageable and material that can be used for a substrate such as MDF, plywood and wood.



Pictured is Bill spreading a uniform layer of glue to the substrate. Note the roll of tape in the background. It is used to seal the veneer along adjoining edges to prevent creep. Also, several types of glue can be used such as Titebond, hide glue and glue made especially for veneers. His recommendation is Unibond One that is sold on the Internet.

Useful tools for Veneering Use sharp scissors, razor blade knife or a veneer saw to cut the veneer slightly larger than the area to be covered. A roller is used to remove air bubbles and get good contact between the substrate and veneer. When cutting seams, use a straight edge to guide the cut and a layout pad that absorbs knife cuts proves useful also. (Sold by craft stores)

#### Coffeyville Sawmill by Mike Ruttgen

On 3/9/2019, I spoke with Joe who owns a sawmill in the Coffeyville, Kansas area. He has 17 wood varieties, primarily hardwoods; \$1.75/bf for most. He has 2 to 3 semi-loads on any given day. He mentioned walnut boards as low as \$5.00 each and as wide as 57". He also has 51" wide Sycamore, 54" wide Maple and 3" thick oak.

He offered to attend an upcoming meeting to talk to us about his products and offerings.


# Presentation for March "Must Have Woodworking Tools" by Robert Karl Rothenbucher
