

Minutes from Last Month's Club Meeting by Bill Morgan

The GCWW club met on 3/14/19 at Robert Rothenbucher's shop. In attendance were Robert Rothenbucher, Mike Mitchell, Gregg Zumwalt, Ray Hucek, Earle Smith, Arthur Barber, Mike Ruttgen, Jim Rouse, and Bill Morgan.

Mike Ruttgen is on the board of his Home Owners Association and they use "Drop Box" as a convenient way to store and share information among the board members. Mike is proposing that we also use this App to archive information for the club. He explained how the system works and what's required for us to use it, Mike has signed himself up for a GCWW "Drop Box" and will send "invitations" to the club officers which will enable us to access and update the club roster and other archived club information.

Mike Mitchell has received a communication from the Lake Erie Tool Works regarding becoming a sponsor for the club. In previous years, we included advertisement spots in the Knothole News and charged the sponsors a nominal annual fee. We also were able to negotiate discounts for club members in some cases. After some discussion, it was agreed that we will follow up with a relaunch of business and membership cards and consider sponsor ads in the Knothole News. Arthur Barber will coordinate the effort

Mike Ruttgen has been in contact with a small sawmill in Coffeyville Kansas that specializes in large rough sawn hardwood slabs. The owner has offered to attend one of our regular meetings to review his operation and show samples of what he has to offer. Mike will contact him and try to arrange for him to attend our April meeting.

Mike Mitchell reminded the group that the annual Woodcarvers show is coming up in June, We can participate at no cost if we just want to try to make some new contacts by handing out flyers and business cards or we can purchase a table and sell items either for the club or individual members benefit. Mike will be at the show, but is signed up to work at his wife's quilting booth.

The theme for the meeting was "go to" tools for the woodworker. Robert Rothenbucher demonstrated the use of the 3 hand planes (block plane, smoothing plane and jack plane) that he considers the essential complement. He also demonstrated the use of a shooting board and the jack plane to square up an edge and then used 2 different spoke shaves to demonstrate how to shape an edge.

Robert has a shop full of hand tools and custom jigs that he's built over the years. He showed a few of his favorites including a "bird cage" awl (similar to a regular awl, but with squared off sides), a few squaring devices and even a "rag in a can" -- an idea he got from watching a Paul Sellers video.

Gregg Zumwalt brought in one of his "go to" tools - - a pair of Brumble "trim gages" which consist of sliding scales which are really helpful in laying out and transferring cut lines.

Each of the tools that were discussed prompted some shared experiences and practical tips for using and maintaining woodworking tools and the group enjoyed coffee, water and cinnamon rolls provided by Robert's wife.

Robert Rothenbucher showed his recently completed sturdy stool. The joinery is unique in that he used only screws entered with pocket-hole jigs.

One of Robert's favored tools is an awl with a 4 square sharp point that's handy in marking and counter sinking smaller screws.



Robert showed how he souped-up his Incra miter gauge used on his Powermatic table saw. He added a wood facing with a stop block and attached a second facing to preserve the setting of the stop block.

The aluminum bar with adjustable stop block fastens to his miter gauge. This setup ensures "longer" crosscuts are all the same length.
