Minutes from Last Month's Club Meeting by Bill Morgan

The GCWW club met on 1/9/20 at Robert Rothenbucher's shop. In attendance were Gregg Zumwalt, Ray Hucek, Earle Smith, Arthur Barber, Mike Ruttgen, Mike Mitchell, Jim Rouse, Harold Blalock, Robert Rothenbucher, Jeff Rienwand and Bill Morgan. Bill Nay (the club's current president) was unable to attend since he's still recuperating from knee replacement surgery. Jim Rouse is scheduled for the same procedure later this month.

It was agreed that this month's 4th Thursday dinner will be at the Cracker Barrel restaurant at 31st and Memorial on 1/23 at 6:00 PM. Bill Morgan will send out the usual reminder early that week.

Mike Mitchell brought in information about this year's Wood Carving and Arts Festival. The club had a table at last year's event and we did make contact with several potential new members for the club. This year's festival will be at the Broken Arrow's Central Park Community Center (same as last year) on June 19 & 20. An 8' X 10" space at the festival would cost \$45 and a rental table goes for \$15. Applications for space need to be in by late May. Bill Morgan has all the detailed information and we'll add it to the agenda for discussion at the April meeting and then we can finalize our plans at the May meeting.

At last month's meeting Robert Rothenbucher demonstrated the fabrication of a box he was building using some white oak that he salvaged from a water damaged floor at his home, At that meeting, Robert cut the slots for some walnut splines he planned to install on the box corners. The original plan was to install the splines and then cut the top free and install the hinges at this month's meeting. The timing was altered a little since his wife Cindy will be delivering the box to a son-in-law on 1/10. Robert had already finished the box and at this meeting he showed the finished product and reviewed the final steps he went through to complete it. He added a suede bottom inside the box and finished it with a high gloss polyurethane.

Robert also showed a pair pliers that he's in the process of refurbishing. He used an abrasive infused fabric wheel (on a bench grinder) which proved to be very effective at polishing up the badly discolored hand tool.

Mike Mitchell brought in a scroll sawed piece that he made by cutting the pattern in Baltic Birch plywood and then mounting it on a black background. The result is a piece that has a striking 3-D appearance.

Earle Smith brought in a couple of trivets he made after spending some time in Jim Rouse's shop to learn the techniques for making the table saw cuts. While Earle made a number of trivets, he brought one in that showed what happens when you skip one of the "locate, cut, flip, locate" steps. He also brought in some photos of a cat house he built in his back yard. It's not clear how his part of Broken Arrow is zoned, but to date he hadn't attracted any occupants.

Mike Ruttgen has been working on improving his dust collection system. With the purchase of a planer, he decided he needed a cyclone collector of some kind to keep the bulk of the chips out of the dust collector bags. He brought in his own version consisting of a metal trash can, some PVC pipe and fittings, a wheeled dolly from Harbor Freight and some misc. material from his shop. The result was a functional cyclone collector with a total material cost of \$51. Robert recently purchased a new drill press and Mike used some of his savings to purchase the vintage machine that the new drill press replaced.

Robert's wife Cindy provided coffee water and snacks for the group and as usual, the conversations covered a wide range of woodworking and health related topics.



T-Track (left over)


Mike Ruttgen still has T-Track for sale for \$9.00 each. He has 3 pieces, 4' long. He will bring them to upcoming meetings.
