I'll make more boxes out of Canarywood later this year for Christmas gifts. (Mike Ruttgen)










Last week my wife noticed Blue Birds sitting on our fence. Hence instructions to immediately construct housing, as they obviously liked the neighborhood. To the shop, found a couple of patterns on the internet, some nice cedar (thanks to Harold Blalock) glued up some pieces to have 5 1/2" wide stock and cut the four sides, top and the bottom. Then drilled the front entrance, figured out how to hinge the front to open for cleaning. Glued it up with Titebond III, took it home for approval and left it on a patio table. The Birds returned and checked it out. Put a quick spray coat of black paint on an old fence post (tree stake) and cut dados in a couple of 2x to make a backing that I screwed together to surround the post and mounted the house. The Birds checked that out and move in about an hour after I finished the installation. They apparently had pre-qualified for the mortgage! (Bill Nay)

I had been meaning to build a drill press table for a long time but got a request for TV trays from my daughter. This caused me to stop procrastinating so that I could drill precise and consistent holes for the tray handles.

I made some TV trays out of white oak. Weaving the oak strips (1/16" thick x 1" wide) was a challenge but worth it for the appearance. I will use Linseed oil for the strips and Polyurethane for the frame.

I soaked the strips in water to make them pliable enough to weave instead of breaking. Once woven, dry and endglued, they are very sturdy. I plan to get some plexiglass cut to set on top of the strips to protect the wood and also create a level surface to sit things on. (Ray Hucek)

I found the plans for this "Greene and Greene
-Styled Side Table" in Woodworker's Journal,
Oct 2008. If you go to the magazine's website,
the plans can be downloaded. Joinery used
was dowels and all pieces are interlocked
making it a solidly built end-table. The walnut was finished with Danish Oil and wipe-on
polyurethane by Minwax. Bill Nay gave me a
helping hand by using his square-chisel mortising tool to make the 18 plug holes.

I could not be happier with the upgrade to my recently acquired 1940's vintage drill press. I replaced the traditional, double-nut, depth stop, which took "forever" to screw up and down, with a push-button, slide-adjust nut.

I unscrewed the original depth rod which revealed a 3/8" hole for the bolt, ordered the push-button nut and then bought the 16 TPI bolt and cut it to length.

As Dakota Hardwoods is up in my "neck of the woods", I stopped by to take a few photos, check out their inventory and talk with their GM, Mr. Jim Beers.

Their core customer base is cabinetry, mill works and home builders. And their inventory reflects what those companies need, namely all types of sheet goods and the associated glues, hardware, fasteners and tools. I think you would be hard pressed to not find the sheet goods you want to buy in various thicknesses and most all common hardwood veneers.

They also have a large inventory of domestic hardwoods including oak, walnut, hard and soft maple, alder, Spanish cedar, cypress, hickory, cherry, basswood, ash, beech, mahogany and poplar.



They have a cross-cut saw to shorten longer boards, but they do not have a panel saw yet for sheet goods.

In time (a) imported hardwoods will be stocked and (b) retail corridors will be sectioned off in the warehouse so that customer can select their boards.

You will need to stop by or call for specific availability and pricing.
