

GCWW Meeting Minutes July 12th and August 2018

The GCWW club met on 7/12/18 at Gregg and Betty Zumwalt's garage shop. In attendance were Gregg and Betty, Ray Hucek, Bill Nay, Harold Blalock Venton Knarr and Bill Morgan.

Both Gregg and Betty are accomplished turners and Betty often demonstrates her skill at public events. They frequently turn tops which not only demonstrate some wood turning basics, but provide take home items that can be enjoyed by kids of all ages.

Betty had a number of blanks prepared which consisted essentially of a length of 1/2" dowel glued into a 3/4" X 2" X 2" piece of wood. She reviewed the basic operation of the lathe, reviewed some safety considerations and equipment and then turned one of the blanks into a colorful top.

Betty used a bowl gouge and spindle gouge to shape the upper portion of the top's spindle and a portion of the top's body. She then chucked up the finished part of the spindle and turned the bottom part of the top. She used magic markers to add a combination of colors to the top and added a spiral to the upper portion of the body of the top - resulting in eye catching patterns as the top spins.

In addition to Betty's big Powermatic lathe, she and Gregg had a mini-lathe set up so that everyone got a chance to try their hand at turning a top. Both Betty and Gregg provided some one one coaching and several functional tops were produced. Everyone picked up a few turning tips and a couple of non-turners had a chance to get a hands on introduction to the lathe.

While it was a warm evening, Gregg has some fans set up and cold water and snacks were available. It was agreed that this month's 4th Thursday dinner would be at the Yutaka Grill and Sushi Buffet which is located in the Farm Shopping Center at 51st street south and Sheridan.

Presentation for September Advantages of Using a Plane By Jim Rouse

Ever used a plane to flatten the face of a board? We all know it is faster and easier using a jointer but many woodworkers do not have this luxury. Twisted, bowed and high spots in boards and slabs can be flatten with a variety of planes.

Jim Rouse will cover the *how to* basics. He will remove the high spots and then smooth the surface. To check his progress he will be using a straightedge and sighting with winding sticks to check flatness.

Several different planes can be used to get the job done. Jim would like everyone who has a plane to bring their favorite one. Through a show and tell process you can describe how the plane is used and provide a tip or two that you have learned on how to get the most from it. Clean wood will be available for those who like to demo their plane.


Sharing ideas leads to knowledge. Hope to see you this coming Thursday, Sept 13th.
